COMMUNITY GARDEN REBUIL

This past fall, the Radnor-Winston Community Garden team of volunteers rebuilt twenty-five raised wooden garden beds at the community garden located on Loyola property behind Popeyes. The original garden beds were built in 2010 when the community garden first began and they have been in use for over twelve growing seasons.

In preparation for the rebuild, the team sourced reclaimed eight-inch boards from Second Chance, Inc., a secondhand store for home goods and materials in downtown Baltimore. Over 100 boards, each spanning 10 to 16 feet in length, were stored in Lia Purpura's shed last summer and were transported out to the community garden this fall in Leila Grohe's truck, Scratchy. Ruth Henry helped cut wood for the beds and the beds were assembled and put in place over five weekends, ending in mid-November. The garden rebuild core team was Kirsty Hambrick, Melissa Osquist, Sam Kessler, and Katarina Carlin. Chris Rutkowski, Taylor La Fave, Mikah Zaslow, Marian Crotty, Karen DeCamp, Rebecca Dineen, Becky Witt, Teri LaMay, Shannon Fleming Bray, Antje Rauwerda, and Emily Finton also pitched in during the project.

The rebuilt beds have already been planted with cooler weather greens (spinach, kale, bok choy and collards),



sowed in the beds after winter in milk jugs. The Community Garden team is already looking forward to the garlic harvest in early summer!

Since 2010, the community garden has flourished with the help of R-W volunteer neighbors, who pitch in weekly to start seeds, provide maintenance around the garden, and, in the harvest seasons, collect and share the bountiful tomatoes, green beans, cucumbers, zucchini, herbs, summer and winter squash and much more! The community garden was one of the earliest donors of fresh produce to the local CARES food pantry and now has five dedicated beds for CARES with biweekly deliveries during peak season. (They love the greens and tomatoes!)

out to Katarina (katarina.carlin@ gmail.com). It is a great way to get to know your R-W neighbors while problem solving a trellis design or tackling a weedy bed. Gardeners learn from each other on all sorts of topics, sharing books to read, menu and recipe ideas, and even providing child advice. Speaking of kids - having the young ones up at the garden helping and learning about growing things is a blast! No experience is necessary!

AREA UPDATES: POPEYES, CREMATORIUM, NOTRE DAME TREES, YORK ROAD CORRIDOR

There has been a lot happening lately around our little neighborhood!

Popeyes Drive-thru

On January 31, we finally got a measure of justice after three years of Popeyes ignoring their commitments connected to their new drive-thru. The City's Board of Municipal Zoning Appeals (BMZA) had actually revoked Popeyes' drive-thru conditional use in March 2022 because of their non-responsiveness to us and the City, but Popeyes continued to operate their drive-thru illegally into January of this year.

In late January, neighbors Lina Ayers, Kevin Zembower, and Dan Pontious attended another BMZA hearing, where Popeyes attempted to restart their drive-thru. Fortunately the Board just barely (2-2) rejected Popeyes' application, based on their track record. The Popeyes owner can re-apply in a year, and we are working to re-establish a relationship with them in the meantime. Vaughn Greene Crematorium

Speaking of the BMZA, our Feb-

ruary 2022 appeal of their October 2021 approval of a human crematorium at the Vaughn Greene Funeral Home across York Road is still pending. Last July our pro-bono attorney argued before Judge Fletcher-Hill that the BMZA had not followed the law in approving the crematorium, and the judge has not yet ruled. We will keep you posted!

Notre Dame Trees

In terms of our neighbor to the west, Notre Dame of Maryland University, they are planning to develop a portion of their land along Homeland Avenue into a new Brightview Senior Living facility, with both independent and assisted living. Especially since they are preparing to cut down some mature trees for that development (which they will need to mitigate by replanting), we are concerned about the university's stewardship of the other beautiful large oak trees on their campus, which seem to be dying at an alarming rate. York Road Corridor

District 4 Updates from the Councilman's Office

Hello Everyone! Councilman Mark Conway here. My team and I have been busy over the past few months, holding hearings on public safety and council bills, as well as pushing for full local control of the Baltimore Police Department to be restored to the city. We've also been probing the conduit system deal between the city and BGE.

We're preparing for an eventful spring as the mayor prepares to release his budget and my office gets ready to introduce bills on improving city government operations. As an alumnus of CitiStat, a program that uses data and robust management to improve city government, I believe I bring a unique perspective to some of the persistent problems we see in delivering basic city services and running our city.

While we are seeing limited improvements, it's no secret that Baltimore still has unacceptable rates of crime and violence. I'm committed to continuing to use my position as chair of the Public Safety Committee to press city officials on the strategies they are using to both respond to crime and address its root causes.
